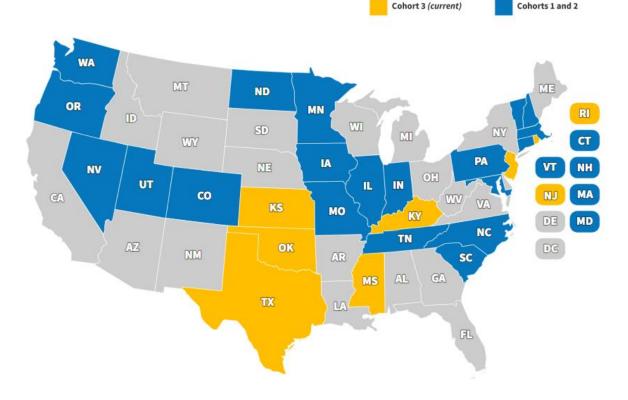

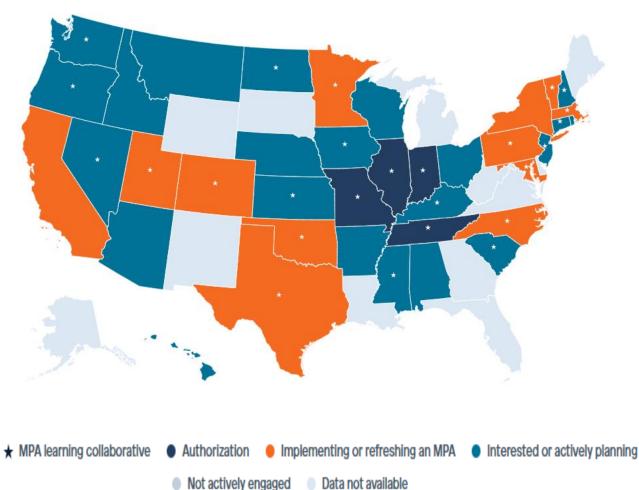








State and Federal Momentum on MPAs

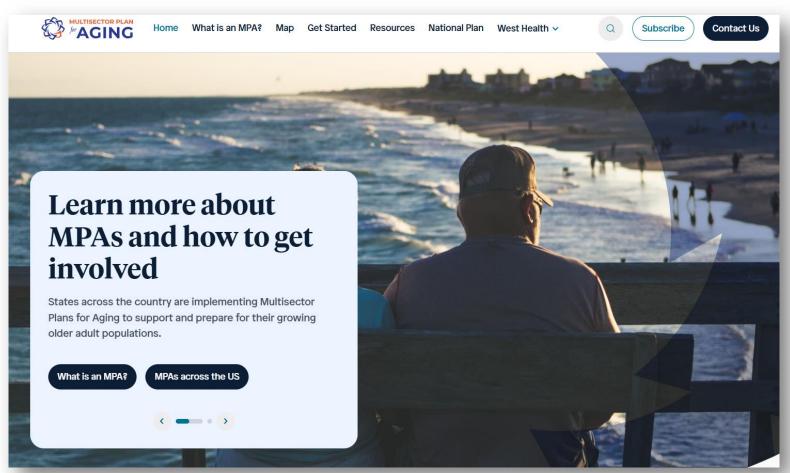


- Over half of states are working towards an MPA
 - → 16 states have some form of authorization (e.g., executive order, legislation, or decree) to pursue and MPA
- As of August 2025, <u>12 states</u> are implementing MPAs
 - → California, Colorado, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New York, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Texas, Utah, and Vermont
- Strategic Framework for a National Plan on Aging (2024) – effort led by the Administration on Community Living, in partnership with other federal agencies and philanthropic partners.





Multisector Plan for Aging Website

Steps for Developing and Managing an MPA

Elevate the issue and opportunity; recruit champions dedicated to advancing an MPA; leverage public and private resources to make the case for an MPA

Work across agencies, departments, and with stakeholders to create a framework for unique and bold strategies. Leverage public and private partnerships; secure funding; deploy large-scale collaboration

IDENTIFY THE NEED



Secure buy-in and commitment from state government leaders through an Executive Order or legislation

SECURE BUY-IN



Develop Stakeholder Advisory Committees; conduct listening sessions; field surveys; hold town halls and webinars. Ensure nontraditional stakeholders are at the table

GATHER INPUT



DEVELOP

DEVELOP GOALS/ PRIORITIES Publish plan-specific initiative to tackle in the short-term; priorities and goals for the longterm; and solicit public comment and feedback



SOLICIT FEEDBACK AND INPUT ON PLAN Build in accountability; track progress with a dashboard and/or progress reports; revise every couple of years to reflect progress and new goals

10 Steps

The Rural MPA Toolkit Describes 10 Steps to Develop a Local MPA

- Step 1: Identify MPA Leadership and Staffing
- Step 2: Form a Local Advisory Committee
- Step 3: Build Public Awareness and Support
- **Step 4:** Conduct a Landscape Analysis of Local Data and Aging Services
- **Step 5:** Facilitate Inclusive Community Engagement
- **Step 6:** Synthesize Findings & Recommendations
- Step 7: Solicit Additional Input to Solidify MPA Goals
- Step 8: Build out the Implementation Plan
- **Step 9:** Evaluate MPA Progress
- Step 10: Ensure Accountability & Sustainability



Implementation: Tracking Progress and Outcomes

- Have tracking measures in place to ensure progress is being made on the goals in the plan
- Methods for tracking implementation:
 - → Dashboards (California)
 - → One-pagers or spreadsheets (<u>Vermont</u>)
 - → Progress reports (Massachusetts)

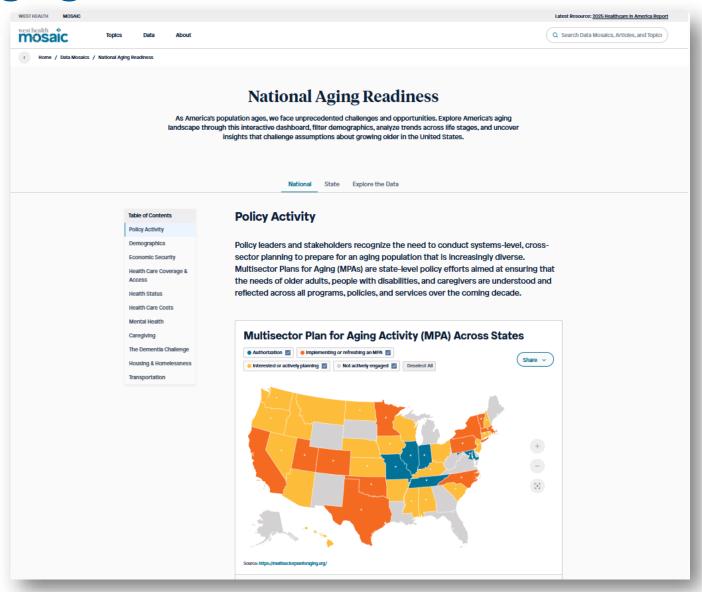


Implementation: Continuous Engagement and Routine Updates

- Continue holding subcommittee meetings during implementation will support accountability to serve as checkpoints for progress
- Continue communication strategies to promote the plan
 - → North Carolina's "I'm Still Here" Campaign
 - → Oklahoma's <u>Ambassador</u> program
 - → ReiMAgine Aging 2030: The Massachusetts Toolkit
- Reassessing the goals at intervals that works best for you and having time frames for reviewing and updating the plans
 - → Consider stakeholder engagement efforts that may be needed, if any
 - → Monitor emerging state and federal policy changes to determine if modifications are needed Center for
